**We, the members of the Storm Lake Police Department, are committed to the safety of our community. We are dedicated to providing police services that improve the quality of life and ensure a fair, safe, and equitable community.**

# Message from the Chief

As we reflect on 2025, I am proud to share the accomplishments and dedication demonstrated by the men and women of the Storm Lake Police Department over the past year.

It is an honor and a privilege to serve this community; one we do not take lightly. On behalf of our entire department, I extend our thanks to the residents, elected officials, and city administration for your continued trust, support, and partnerships.

While there is much to be proud of, 2025 did not come without challenges.

In January of 2025, our community experienced one of the most difficult and dangerous incidents in our city's history. Over the course of 19 hours, Storm Lake Police officers, alongside nearly 150 law enforcement officers from multiple agencies, faced a violent, volatile, and rapidly evolving situation. A barricaded gunman fired hundreds of rounds at responding officers within a residential neighborhood in the heart of our city.

Surrounding areas were evacuated, information was shared with the community, and every effort was made, patiently and deliberately to negotiate a peaceful surrender. Despite those efforts, the outcome was not what we hoped for; that decision ultimately rested with the suspect.

Our officers and partner agencies met this crisis with teamwork, restraint, courage, and resolve. Even amid extreme danger, Storm Lake officers continued to answer calls for service across the city with compassion, professionalism, and care. We are incredibly proud of our personnel and deeply grateful to every agency and first responder who came to our aid. Their cooperation and commitment exemplified the very best of public service.

In addition to this incident, our department assisted in emergency responses to several violent storms throughout the year that caused widespread power outages and significant damage to homes and businesses. Once again, our officers worked alongside city officials and partner agencies to ensure public safety, provide assistance, and help our community recover.

Despite these challenges, the department recorded an 11.982% decrease in Part I Uniform Crime Reporting offenses. This reduction is a reflection of the hard work, dedication, and daily commitment of the men and women of the police department, whose efforts continue to make a positive impact in our community.

We did, however, see an increase in juvenile-related arrests. We continue to address these concerns through enforcement, prevention, and community-based partnerships focused on early intervention and long-term solutions.

Technology continued to play an important role in enhancing public safety. In late 2024 and early 2025, the Storm Lake Police Department began implementing Flock Community Safety Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) cameras as part of our commitment to using proven, responsible technology. Stationary ALPR cameras were installed at strategic locations to assist officers in identifying vehicles associated with criminal activity, stolen vehicles, missing or endangered persons, and active investigations.

These systems capture only license plate numbers and vehicle characteristics—not personal or driver information—and all data is automatically deleted after 30 days.

Since implementation, the department has deployed 24 ALPR and related cameras. In 2025 alone, these tools assisted in the clearance of 51 cases, 40 of which resulted in arrests, and contributed to the recovery of nine stolen vehicles and more than \$103,000 in stolen property. This technology has strengthened investigations involving violent offenders, property crimes, and outstanding warrants.

Community support also made it possible to honor a legacy and invest in the future of our K-9 program. Following the loss of K-9 Ozzy in 2024, generous donations and community backing allowed the department to purchase and train a new police service dog. K-9 Duke was officially sworn in on June 2, 2025, and is assigned to Officer Mitchell Fritz. This support is a powerful reminder of the bond between our community and those who serve it.

Building trust through engagement and outreach remained a priority in 2025. We were honored to host a team of officers from the Pelham, Alabama Police Department, who spent several days embedded with our department to learn how we utilize outreach and engagement in Storm Lake to better serve our community. Together, we participated in events such as Tacos with a Cop, Kids Fest, and building and delivering beds to families in need through the nonprofit “Sleep in Heavenly Peace”. Sharing our experiences and learning from one another was both humbling and rewarding.

Throughout much of 2025, the department operated short-staffed due to the overseas deployments of two of our officers in service to our country. We are proud to report that one officer has safely returned home and is back on duty, with the second expected to return this spring. We are currently fully staffed, with the exception of that officer still deployed, and we remain grateful for the sacrifices made by our officers and their families.

The year also required difficult organizational decisions due to budget constraints. As part of a departmental reorganization, Community Service Officer (CSO) positions were eliminated, and City Code Enforcement operations were transitioned from the Police Department to the Building Code and Compliance Department. CSO Yang continues to serve the community as a city employee, now working from City Hall. Additionally, we reduced office positions following the departure of our office manager. While these changes marked a shift in structure, our goal remained the same: to deliver city services efficiently and responsibly while maintaining strong partnerships in service to the community.

Looking ahead to 2026, we are excited about new investments that will further enhance transparency, safety, and efficiency. The department recently signed a contract with Axon for new body-worn cameras and in-car camera systems. These systems include advanced features such as real-time language interpretation for over 50 languages, improving officer safety and communication in the field. Axon's AI-enabled tools will help streamline report writing, save valuable time, enhance investigations, and support community engagement through improved documentation and accountability. In addition, new in-car license plate recognition systems will serve as a force multiplier, helping officers solve crimes more efficiently and remove violent offenders from our streets.

Throughout 2025, Storm Lake Police officers were recognized for acts of professionalism, compassion, and service, from lifesaving responses and major case resolutions to youth engagement and community-focused initiatives that reflect the values of this department.

As Chief, I could not be more proud of the dedication, integrity, and resilience shown by our team. The work they do is not easy, but it is meaningful, and it is strengthened every day by the support of the community we serve. Thank you for standing with us during both the calm moments and the most difficult ones. We remain committed to serving Storm Lake with professionalism, compassion, and dedication in the year ahead.





# Storm Lake Demographics


Storm Lake is one of the most diverse Cities in the State of Iowa. In 2025 the Storm Lake Community School District reported their student population was 57.8% Hispanic, 12.7% Asian, 4.9% Black, 11.9% White, 10.3% Pacific Islander and 1.8% other races. STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS**




**CITY OF STORM LAKE DEMOGRAPHICS**



# Demographics – Languages


47.3% of Storm Lake residents speak English, while 52.7% speak other languages.

# Complaints of Misconduct

The goal of the Storm Lake Police Department is to respond fairly and effectively to allegations of employee misconduct. Integrity and honesty are paramount to the policing profession, and it is expected of all members of the Storm Lake Police Department. A proper relationship fostered by confidence and trust between the Storm Lake Police Department and the citizens and visitors of the City of Storm Lake is essential to effective law enforcement.

Personnel complaints against department officers can originate from inside or outside the department. A complaint can be a report of wrongdoing or inappropriate action on the part of any employee of the Storm Lake Police Department.

When a person has a complaint against a police department employee (sworn or civilian), the complaint may be filed in person, by telephone at 712-732-8010, or by completing a citizen commendation / complaint form and sending it to the Chief of Police. This form is available on the City Website, City Hall and at the Storm Lake Police Department.

When a person files a complaint, it may be considered a formal or informal complaint.

Informal complaints are minor in nature and can be resolved without a formal process and may be referred to the employee's supervisors. The supervisor will investigate the complaint, communicate with the initial caller, and identify a resolution to the complaint.

Formal complaints will be presented to the City Manager and Chief of Police, who will appoint an investigator to conduct a complete investigation of the complaint filed. The findings of the investigation will be reported to the City Manager and Civil Service Commission when applicable.

In most cases, a supervisor specially trained in these types of investigations will conduct the investigation with the disposition of each case being reviewed by the Chief of Police.

Whenever possible, the investigation will be concluded within 30 days unless unusual circumstances warrant an extension. The Department will make every effort to keep the complainant advised of the progress of the investigation. Once the investigation is completed, the complainant will be notified.

Allegations of misconduct are thoroughly investigated for three reasons:

**Protection of the Public** - The public has the right to receive fair, efficient, and impartial law enforcement. An informed public must have confidence that its police department honestly and fairly investigates and adjudicates all allegations of misconduct.

**Protection of the Department** - A department is often evaluated and judged by the conduct of its individual employees. It is imperative that the whole organization not be criticized because of the misconduct of a few.

**Protection of the Employee** - Employees must be protected against false or misinformed allegations of misconduct.

Each personnel complaint after being thoroughly investigated will be classified with one of the following dispositions:

- **Unfounded** - When the investigation discloses that the alleged acts did not occur or did not involve department members. Complaints that are determined to be frivolous will fall within the classification of unfounded.
- **Exonerated** - When the investigation discloses that the alleged act occurred but that the act was justified, lawful and/or proper.
- **Not sustained** - When the investigation discloses that there is insufficient evidence to sustain the complaint or fully exonerate the member.
- **Sustained** - When the investigation discloses sufficient evidence to establish that the act occurred and that it constituted misconduct.
- In 2025 there were four complaints of misconduct against a total of three officers. Two of the complaints were exonerated, and the other two complaints were sustained.

# Automated License Plate Readers (ALPR)

- In late 2024, the Storm Lake Police Department began implementing Flock Community Safety Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) cameras as part of its ongoing commitment to enhancing public safety through proven technology.
- Stationary ALPR cameras were installed at strategic locations to assist officers in identifying vehicles associated with criminal activity, stolen vehicles, missing or endangered persons, and active investigations, while capturing only license plate numbers and vehicle characteristics—not personal or driver information—with data automatically deleted after 30 days.
- Since implementation, the department has deployed 24 ALPR and related cameras, which proved invaluable in 2025. We had 60 successes clearing 51 cases, 40 of which resulted in arrests, and contributing to the recovery of nine stolen vehicles and \$103,183 value in recovered property. These tools have strengthened investigations involving violent offenders, property crimes, and outstanding warrants, while the department continues its commitment to transparency by sharing ALPR usage data through its public Transparency Portal which is located on the City of Storm Lake's Webpage.



Successes over Time






## K-9 Duke & Handler Officer Mitch Fritz





## Deployments By Month





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







# Criminal Investigations Overview

The Storm Lake Police Criminal Investigation Division (CID) provides the highest quality criminal investigations by conducting timely and thorough criminal investigations using advanced investigative techniques and forensic equipment. Motivated only by a search for the truth.

Detectives Weflen and Nieland will search out and collect all available evidence surrounding each case to exonerate the innocent and substantiate the culpability of the guilty. As professional fact finders, these two detectives will conduct systematic and methodical investigations to determine what findings the evidence supports and will not form conclusions in advance. They recognize their responsibilities to the community they serve and are committed to investigating all criminal allegations in an ethical and impartial manner with sensitivity toward the needs of victims and witnesses.

The detectives are steadfast in their resolve and will mobilize all available resources to accomplish their mission, despite any obstacles, discouragement, or danger. The Storm Lake Police Departments investigators are dedicated to providing superior investigative services to the citizens of Storm Lake and to preserve the quality of life that our citizens and visitors enjoy.

# Criminal Investigations Functions

The Criminal Investigation Division, commonly known as CID, provides professional investigative services to the Citizens of Storm Lake. The investigators are responsible for investigating all serious crimes, less serious crimes as assigned or needed and to conduct sensitive or special interest investigations as directed by the Chief or Assistant Chief.

Detectives primarily investigate felony-level crimes and provide criminal investigative support to the Patrol Division. CID works closely with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies to counter and investigate serious crimes.

CID conducts a broad spectrum of criminal investigations to include death investigations, serious assaults including sexual assault, robbery, burglary, fraud, computer crimes and drug enforcement.

Specific functions include:

- \* Investigate serious crime - and less serious crimes upon request or as needed
- \* Perform drug suppression operations
- \* Collect, analyze and disseminate criminal intelligence
- \* Liaison with other local, state and Federal investigative agencies/units
- \* Liaison with County Attorney, Attorney General, and the United States Attorney's Offices
- \* Conduct pre-employment background investigations
- \* Conduct missing persons investigations
- \* Conduct internal affairs investigations
- \* Collect and examine evidence at crime scenes
- \* Maintain custody of physical and drug evidence
- \* Provide protective services
- \* Conduct sensitive or special interest investigations as directed by the Chief of Police.

# Criminal Investigation Highlights

- **January 2025-** Storm Lake Police were notified of reports to several burglaries to vehicles during overnight hours throughout the Storm Lake area. Police responded and ultimately identified two juvenile suspects in the incident. Both juveniles were charged with multiple counts of burglary and transported to a juvenile center for placement.
- **January 2025-** Storm Lake Police were notified of a driver who made threats towards law enforcement and fled in a vehicle from a Buena Vista County Sheriff's Deputy. Police assisted the BVSO in pursuing the driver back to their residence in Storm Lake, where they exited their vehicle and subsequently barricaded themselves in their home for several hours during a standoff with law enforcement involving multiple law enforcement agencies. During the standoff, the suspect fired over one hundred shots at law enforcement. After 19 hours, two Iowa State Patrol troopers deployed with sniper rifles fired one shot each that fatally hit the suspect, ending the standoff.
- **January 2025-** Police responded to a local business for a report of a subject appearing to be intoxicated and was armed with a firearm. Police allege that upon making contact with the suspect they displayed the firearm. Police disarmed the suspect who was ultimately charged with carrying a dangerous weapon while intoxicated.
- **February 2025-** Storm Lake Police arrested two suspects on felony drug charges stemming from an incident in which both suspects possessed over 8 grams of methamphetamine packaged for distribution.
- **February 2025-** Storm Lake Police were advised of a belated stabbing where a victim suffered non-life-threatening upper body wounds. Police investigated the incident and ultimately charged a male and female with felony willful injury and domestic assault.
- **March 2025-** Storm Lake Police were called in the early morning hours to a Storm Lake nightclub for a report of a disturbance. On arrival police were advised of several people being involved in a physical fight outside of the nightclub. As a result of the incident police charged three adult males and one juvenile male with felony rioting.
- **March 2025-** A Storm Lake Police officer conducted a traffic stop in Storm Lake for a minor violation. During the course of the stop, the officer detected an order of marijuana. Following a search, the officers located a firearm in the driver's possession. Police further found the driver to have previous felony level convictions. Investigators worked with the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms and the United States Attorneys Office where the suspect was ultimately sentenced in federal court to 30 months imprisonment.
- **March 2025-** Storm Lake Police assisted federal authorities in locating and arresting a suspect residing in Storm Lake on federal indictments for child pornography charges. The suspect has ultimately pleaded guilty and is awaiting sentencing.

# Highlights Continued

- **April 2025-** Storm Lake Police officers on patrol observed an odor of marijuana coming from a Storm Lake apartment. Officers worked with investigators to obtain a search warrant and following a search police located a quantity of marijuana inside the apartment. The suspect in the incident was charged with felony level drug violations.
- **April 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a disturbance at a local Storm Lake park involving multiple juveniles. Police responded and identified four suspects in the incident. As a result of the incident, four juveniles were located and charged with felony rioting.
- **April 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a local Storm Lake apartment for a report of a disturbance. On arrival police observed an odor of marijuana in the apartment. Police obtained a search warrant and located methamphetamine and other drug equipment. As a result of the incident a suspect was charged with felony level drug offenses.
- **April 2025** – A Storm Lake Police officer was dispatched to a 911 call of a reported assault. On arrival police found the reporting party who began attacking the officer and attempted to grab items on the officer's duty belt. Police found no evidence of a reported assault. The suspect was ultimately apprehended and charged with felony assault of an officer.
- **April 2025** – A Storm Lake Police officer attempted to conduct a traffic stop on a speeding vehicle when it accelerated and fled through a residential area. Police allege the vehicle eluded the officer until it drove off the roadway and struck three unoccupied vehicles. Police ultimately apprehended the driver who was charged with felony eluding and drug charges.
- **May 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a Storm Lake residence for a report of a disturbance. On arrival police spoke with a victim who alleged they were sexually assaulted by a subject while minor children were present. As a result of the incident the suspect was charged with felony sexual assault, domestic assault as well as child endangerment charges.

# Highlights Continued

**May 2025** – Storm Lake Police investigated a report that a suspect in a pending felony criminal investigation tampered with witnesses to alter statements made in the investigation. As a result of the incident the suspect was charged with felony witness tampering.

**June 2025** – Storm Lake Police received a report of a vehicle stolen from a residence in Storm Lake.

Investigators were later notified that the stolen vehicle and suspect were located in a neighboring state, and the suspect was ultimately charged with felony theft.

**June 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a local business for a report of a suspicious activity. On arrival police were advised by witnesses that a suspect left a suspicious package by a propane display and made concerning comments. Police evacuated the business and investigated the incident in conjunction with the Iowa State Fire Marshal's Office and numerous other agencies. Utilizing drones and X-ray technology law enforcement deemed the package safe. Following an extensive investigation into the incident, police charged a suspect with felony terrorism and drug charges.

**July 2025** – A Storm Lake Police officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle for a minor violation. On approach to the vehicle the officer observed an odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle. Following a probable cause search officers located marijuana, THC products and drug equipment. Both occupants were charged with felony drug charges.

**July 2025** – Storm Lake Police responded to a local waterpark for multiple reports of theft of personal property. After on scene investigation police allege a juvenile waterpark patron had stolen several items from others. The juvenile was taken into custody and charged with felony theft.

**July 2025** – Storm Lake Police arrested a subject for two felony drug violations for two alleged incidents of selling a quantity of marijuana to another in Storm Lake.

**July 2025** – Storm Lake Police arrested a subject for a felony drug violations for one alleged incident of selling a quantity of methamphetamine to another in Storm Lake.

# Highlights Continued

- **August 2025** – A Storm Lake Police officer observed a vehicle driving in a reckless manner through a residential neighborhood. Upon attempting to stop the vehicle, the driver fled and a pursuit followed. The vehicle ultimately stopped after several blocks, and the juvenile driver was taken into custody. The juvenile was charged with felony eluding and multiple traffic violations.
- **August 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a local hospital for a report of a victim presenting with serious injuries from a knife wound. After investigation into the incident, police allege the victim was stabbed during a confrontation. The suspect was located and charged with felony assault and dangerous weapon charges.
- **August 2025** – Storm Lake Police responded to a report of a man carrying a handgun around a local neighborhood and making threats to kill someone. Police responded to the area and conducted a search for the suspect. While conducting investigation on scene police identified the suspect in the incident. The Storm Lake Police Department and Buena Vista County tactical teams responded and ultimately located the suspect at a Storm Lake residence. The suspect in the incident was charged with multiple felonies including Burglary, Threats of Terrorism, and Willful Injury among others.
- **September 2025** – Storm Lake Police were notified of two belated vehicle burglaries with significant damage consistent with the vehicle attempting to be stolen. Police were soon after called to a report of a stolen vehicle. Police entered the vehicle in a nationwide database, and later that same date the vehicle was located in the Des Moines area being driven by two juveniles from the Storm Lake area. The juveniles were ultimately taken into custody after a brief foot pursuit and charged with felony theft.
- **September 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a report of a domestic disturbance. On arrival police found a victim suffering from serious facial injuries. A suspect was taken into custody on scene. The victim was later found to have significant head injuries and was later flown to a medical facility for treatment. The suspect in the incident was charged with felony assault causing serious injury.
- **September 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a local nightclub for a report of a large fight inside. On arrival police were advised multiple people were involved in physical fighting, with many throwing bottles at patrons. Investigators worked to identify those involved, and as a result charged five subjects with felony rioting and assault with a dangerous weapon, among other crimes.
- **September 2025** – Storm Lake Police were notified of a hit and run accident involving two bicyclists who were struck by a vehicle which fled the scene. Both bicyclists sustained serious facial and upper body injuries. Police recovered debris from the scene and launched an investigation into the incident. As a result of the investigation a suspect was charged with felony leaving the scene of an accident.

# Highlights Continued

- **September 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a burglary at a Storm Lake residence. Police were further advised that a minor victim inside the residence was sexual assaulted. Following investigation, police charged two juveniles with felony burglary, sexual abuse, assault and theft charges.
- **October 2025** – Storm Lake Police conducted a traffic stop on a suspicious vehicle. After making contact with the driver the officer detected an odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle. Following a search, police located a stolen handgun in the vehicle. Police further found the driver to have previous convictions barring them from possessing firearms. The suspect was charged with possession of firearm as a felon and trafficking stolen weapons.
- **October 2025** – Storm Lake Police received a report of a belated sexual assault of a minor victim. After investigation into the incident, police charged a juvenile with felony sexual abuse.
- **October 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a local business for a report of a theft in which the suspect fled from store employees. On police arrival, the suspect fled from police in a vehicle at a high rate of speed, eventually crashing the vehicle in a rural area outside of city limits and fleeing on foot. The suspect was located several days later and charged with eluding, several driving offenses as well as theft charges.
- **October 2025** – A Storm Lake Police officer on patrol observed an odor of marijuana coming from a Storm Lake residence. Following acquisition of a search warrant, police searched the residence and located approximately a ½ pound of marijuana along with THC products and drug equipment. Two occupants were charged with felony drug offenses.
- **October 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a report of an assault. On arrival police were advised by victims that while inside a vehicle, a suspect entered the vehicle and assaulted them. As a result of the incident a juvenile was charged with felony burglary and assault.


# Highlights Continued

- **November 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a disturbance at a Storm Lake residence. On arrival police located a suspect who was alleged to have assaulted another and damaged property. After taking the suspect into custody, police allege the suspect was physically and verbally resistive and spat onto two officer's faces. The suspect was charged with multiple assault and criminal mischief charges.
- **November 2025** – Storm Lake Police while on an unrelated incident were confronted by a suspect who threatened the lives of law enforcement officers. The suspect was ultimately charged with harassment in the 1<sup>st</sup> degree.
- **December 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a Storm Lake residence for a report of a disturbance. On arrival police were advised that a suspect had assaulted a victim by grabbing them by the neck and threatening to kill them. The suspect was ultimately charged with felony domestic abuse strangulation, harassment among other charges.
- **December 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a local business for a report of a customer causing a disturbance. On arrival police were advised that the suspect, a juvenile, had damaged and entered a victim's vehicle. The juvenile suspect then fled on foot from police and was ultimately apprehended. The juvenile was charged with felony burglary, disorderly conduct, interference with official acts, among other charges.
- **December 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a Storm Lake residence to assist medical personnel. On arrival police were confronted by a suspect present who became belligerent with officers. Police alleged the suspect then became physically aggressive and attempted to disarm the police officer of their firearm. The suspect was ultimately subdued and taken into custody where they were charged with disarming a peace officer, a felony.
- **December 2025** – Storm Lake Police were called to a hit and run accident involving a subject in a wheelchair who was struck by a vehicle while crossing the roadway. Police allege the suspect vehicle fled the scene after the accident. Police ultimately located the suspect vehicle and charged the driver with leaving the scene of an accident and several traffic violations.

# Dive Team


- The Storm Lake Police Department currently has two officers assigned to the Buena Vista County Search and Recovery Dive Team.

# Storm Lake Police Clandestine Lab Team


- The mission of the Storm Lake Department of Public Safety Clandestine Lab Team is to identify, process for evidence, and eradicate all actual and suspected illegal clandestine labs within the jurisdiction of the Storm Lake Police Department, or when called upon to provide assistance to another jurisdiction.
- The primary goal in every response made by the Clandestine Lab Team is to ensure the safety of responding personnel, the public, and the environment. This goal requires the utmost level of professionalism, attention to detail, and thoroughness. The dedication and discipline inherent in these qualities is found in every member of the Clandestine Lab Team.

# 2025 Lab Team Activations


- The Clandestine Lab Team was formed with the assistance of a federal grant in 2003 and consists of 2 team members including Police Lt. Jeff Lundberg and Firefighter Josh Fevold. Both team members are certified clandestine lab responders. Members of the Lab Team take on these additional responsibilities along with their regular duty assignments, within their respective departments such as patrol, investigations, traffic enforcement, code enforcement, and fighting fires.
- Each certified member must undergo specialized lab training that includes a 40-hour Basic Lab certification course, advanced investigative and evidence sampling classes, advanced tactical entry and weapons training, a medical exam, and ongoing training classes. Each team member is certified as a hazardous material technicians and Firefighter Fevold is certified to the operations level.
- The Clandestine Lab team utilizes many unique pieces of equipment to accomplish their mission including air monitoring devices, chemical resistant suits, gloves and boots, self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA), digital video devices, current computer technology, as well as a 1994 GMC pickup truck acquired from the Storm Lake Fire Department after it was retired in 2013.

The Storm Lake Police Department Entry Team is used in situations that present an elevated degree of danger to life and property. The mission of the team is to provide a well-disciplined, well-trained, and efficient unit, which can be utilized by the police department in situations where the public and individual officers are in extreme danger and at a distinct disadvantage. The team members are specifically trained in the use of specialized weapons and tactics. Team members train a minimum of four hours per month and train in the use of both lethal and less lethal devices. Team members are trained in the use of various weapons including M-4 rifles, submachine guns, pepper ball guns, beanbag guns, and tasers. Team members are also trained in the use of diversion devices, gas deployment, low light shooting, and both dynamic and stealth team movements.

# SLPD Drone Program

- The SLPD Drone program was formed in 2018 following a series of search/rescue incidents which identified a need for the technology. In 2018 the SLPD purchased and deployed a DJI Phantom 3 drone in conjunction with the launch of the drone program. In 2019, an additional drone, a DJI Mavic Dual equipped with FLIR thermal imaging was purchased and deployed with the program, allowing pilots to conduct night operations. In 2025, a DJI Avata 2 drone was added to the fleet, adding a compact option with upgraded technologies.
- The SLPD Drone program consists of two certified pilots, Officer Alyssa Solem and Assistant Chief Patrick Diekman, who also serves as the program coordinator. Both pilots are licensed and certified remote pilots of small unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) through the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Pilots are required to pass an aeronautical knowledge test through the FAA, demonstrating knowledge of safe operations of drones through FAA regulations.
- Pilots are required to complete monthly training for preparedness for a variety of scenarios such as:
  - \*Search and Rescue Operations
  - \*Fatality or serious injury accident Investigations
  - \*Crime Scene Documentation
  - \*Damage Assessment
  - \*Disaster Scenes
  - \*Tactical Operations
  - \*HazMat
  - \*Event Security
  - \*Other Incidents as needed

# SLPD Community Service Officer



In 2025, budget constraints required the department to make difficult organizational changes. As part of this reorganization, Community Service Officer (CSO) positions were eliminated, and City Code Enforcement operations were transitioned from the Police Department to the Building Codes and Compliance Department. CSO Yang continues to serve the community as a city employee, now working at City Hall. While these changes marked a shift in structure, the goal remained the same: to ensure city services are delivered efficiently and responsibly while maintaining strong partnerships across departments in service to the community.

# Operation Clean Sweep

- Operation Clean Sweep was designed to utilize the community service officer with the police department to seek out property owners and renters, and educate them to the city's laws on trash, public nuisances, and safety issues. Operation Clean Sweep was designed to be educationally based and speak face-to-face with individuals whose property had violations of city ordinances.
- Operation Clean Sweep is an ongoing program. The program will continue to elevate the quality of life in Storm Lake.
- During 2025, CSO's contacted **860** individuals who had public nuisances on their property. Of the **860** people contacted, **858** voluntarily cleaned the nuisance. During the 2025 year, **2** people were cited for failing to clean up their property after being shown what the nuisance was.







# YumVee Ice Cream Truck Patrols


